Sustainable Improvements Grant



At Building Sustainable Connections, we work tirelessly to prove that every step your organization makes toward a cleaner, greener, and just community is meaningful.

One way we work to promote sustainable changes within our community is through our Sustainable Improvements Grant. Started in 2022 with thanks to a grant from the Midco Foundation, Building Sustainable Connections launched a microgrant program in April of 2023 that offered up to \$300 to qualified businesses. Through our online application process, applicants were able to tell our Grants Committee how \$300 could help them achieve their sustainability goals.



Among our awardees for 2023 was the Sanford Research Green Committee. In her application, Dr. Kara McCormick noted that the Green Committee was in its early days at Sanford Research Center, and among its top priorities was the promotion of sustainable common spaces. The committee unearthed hydroponic growing towers from storage and utilized the Sustainable Improvement Grant as an opportunity to rebuild the system and begin growing healthy, edible greens for the north Sioux Falls campus.



From McCormick:

"Thanks to the sustainability grant, we've successfully installed three grow towers in our employee breakroom. We're currently cultivating a variety of herbs and lettuces, which our employees can harvest and even have a say in what's grown. This initiative is fostering a more sustainable food ecosystem within our workplace, contributing to both employee well-being and environmental responsibility. The grant funds covered the grow kits, baskets, mineral blend, and tools needed to bring this project to life."

CNH

RAVEN

Founded in 1956, Raven has been an integral member of the Sioux Falls community for nearly seven decades. Together with CNH, a global leader in ag and construction equipment, Raven is deeply committed to sustainable practices and environmental responsibility around the globe.

Raven's downtown headquarters building is LEED® Gold certified and stands as a testament to its commitment to sustainable building practices. The facility features low-flow lavatories that have effectively reduced water waste by an impressive 41%. The facility's "green" roof composed of living plants goes beyond aesthetics by providing water filtration, improving heat efficiency, and collecting rainwater for landscape irrigation. Sustainability is also integrated into daily onsite operations, from recycling systems to reusing materials, demonstrating a comprehensive approach to environmental responsibility.

Raven's dedication to sustainability also extends to its product lines. Precision agriculture products have been enabling farmers to be good stewards of the land since Raven began developing precision agriculture products in the 1970s. As a member of Operation Weed Eradication, Raven also contributes to sustainable practices for farmers, supporting efforts to remove weeds from their farms in an environmentally friendly manner.

Raven and CNH's commitment to environmental responsibility goes beyond business operations, engaging employees in community-driven initiatives. The Sioux Falls site has a dedicated Sustainability Committee that leads various initiatives to promote sustainable practices, and in 2023, employee-organized river cleanup events resulted in the removal of over 500 pounds of trash from the Big Sioux River. These collective actions reflect Raven and CNH's dedication to fostering a sense of shared values, engaging employees in the pursuit of a more sustainable future for Sioux Falls and beyond.

Founded on the core values of conservation and camaraderie through exploring the great outdoors, Dakota Adventure Supply works to create high quality, locally made outdoor gear. From the beginning of their operations, co-founders Jeff Hayward and Paxton Alsgaard sought to create outdoor gear that would withstand the test of whatever adventures lie ahead. Inspired by their Eagle Scout achievements, Jeff and Paxton launched their patch and repair program for their signature "Adventure Tote" where totes that had been weathered or torn could be sent back to their production facility for repair. As production increased, Dakota Adventure Supply worked with their South Dakota-based manufacturing company to create high-quality products out of waste canvas and mesh products sourced from the company's production line. These include their accessory pouch and axe head sheath. Dakota Adventure Supply works locally with a manufacturing company close to their Sioux Falls office at Start Up Sioux Falls in an effort to decrease the offsets associated with shipping and distribution. They also offer local pickup at their convenient downtown location for Startup Sioux Falls members, and only use carbon conscious ground shipping options with electronic invoices and packing slips to avoid paper waste.

Additionally, Dakota Adventure Supply utilizes a coworking space with shared printers, Energy Star appliances, and occupancy sensors to reduce energy loss.

Millennium Recycling is one of the country's most efficient material recovery facilities (MRFs); continually adapting and researching ways to stay ahead of the single stream recycling process. Serving communities across the Upper Midwest, Millennium uses state-of-the art optical sorters, screens, magnets, and other sorting mechanisms to separate recyclable items. This process helps to make recycling more accessible and easier for consumers, and it also diverts a significant amount of waste from landfills.

Founded in 1999, Millennium Recycling has grown with intention: continually finding innovative ways to not only give a second life to items in their recycling facility, but also to improve the lives of the local community. One way they accomplish this is through participating in second chance employment. This gives members of the local community a fresh start to rebuild lives after incarceration. Millennium also partners with local nonprofits to contribute to community welfare and waste diversion efforts. This includes Millennium Recycling's nonprofit division, BINfluencers, which collaborates with area organizations to provide education and opportunities for waste diversion in the communities they serve.

Millennium's commitment to waste diversion does not end with the impressive actions of their facility. In addition to the thousands of tons of recyclables their facility processes each month, they also participate in local pallet recycling programs. This helps to create a more sustainable wood recycling program as pallets are mulched to landscaping materials at their end-of-life cycle.

At their Sioux Falls facility, Millennium has made providing meals for its employees a daily priority. This not only creates a great benefit of employment, but helps to reduce carbon emissions associated with mealtime travel. While the nature of the facility's operations requires a great deal of paved surfaces, Millennium has included pollinator pots and native landscaping near employee and visitor entrances.

The Importance of Climate Hope

Like many of you reading this newsletter, I am engaged in many activities focused on creating lasting, sustainable change. I subscribe to local, and national regional, newsletters inspiration, I work directly in the sustainability field, I serve on boards for climate and environmentally-focused organizations, and I am constantly looking for the "wins" for people, the planet, and the economy. However, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge that sometimes, the work can be overwhelming. It can seem like there is so much to do and that there is not "enough" to accomplish the external goals.


Whether that's enough time, energy, or even enough progress overall, it can be disheartening to compare our individual capacity to the overall scope of work ahead. However, it is important to remember that progress never happens in a vacuum; it requires collaboration, teamwork, and many people to unite for a common purpose.

If you're like me, you often find yourself too close to the work to step back and recognize the systems you are currently working within. I know I have an excellent team around me, I have a strong network of people invested in seeing the same goals for my community, and I know that there are so many other incredible organizations working to address sustainability from various angles. However, when you're no longer seeing the forest for the trees, it can require what I'm calling a "hard reset in nature."

Enter the idea of a Climate Hope Retreat!

While talking with a dear friend working in climate adaptation, we both found ourselves feeling burnt out in a way that we couldn't quite pinpoint. We saw ourselves working nonstop, and we were finding it difficult to measure the successes or acknowledge progress made along the way. However, in reflecting on what ignited our drive to action, we noticed that the burnout lessened when we were in dedicated spaces with like-minded individuals who also focused on climate and sustainability work. We devised a plan to bring a group together and learn from the experiences of one another in a meaningful space; guided by a climate grief counselor.

There were a few key elements that were crucial to the success of this retreat:

Keys to a Successful Climate Hope Retreat

- Location connected to nature
- · Inclusion of mental health professional
- Varied schedule
- Low-cost to participants

First and foremost, we focused on finding a location that was grounded in nature. It was important to be surrounded by reminders of what we were working to preserve.



For the record, the science behind nature-based education is astounding. Not only does it lead to deeper learning outcomes, but it can improve physical and mental well-being as well.

Additionally, we knew that it was important to have a licensed therapist with experience in climate counseling. In an early 2020 study, nearly 70% of adults reported experiencing "at some anxiety" least or eco-grief associated with environmental change (American Psychological Association). This number rises dramatically in younger generations and with individuals working in sustainability and climate action. Having a counselor on hand to help navigate and recognize the somatic responses associated with eco-grief and eco-anxiety was crucial to the event's success.

We also wanted to make sure that all participants had the opportunity to lead a session highlighting their perspectives and expertise. Each of us has a unique lived experience, skillset, and outlook on varying topics or approaches. Affording everyone an opportunity to share that outlook was important not only to keep variety and engaging topics on the schedule of the retreat, but also to help celebrate the accomplishments of all in attendance.

The final key element was to keep the retreat as low-cost to participants as possible. If we want to engage as many people as possible from as many backgrounds and fields as possible, we knew it was important to ensure that cost was not a prohibiting factor for attendance.

The agenda was decided by a committee of attendees, and at the end of the retreat, I walked away with some incredible lessons learned. Not only about how I need to approach activism in a more sustainable way, but also the absolute importance of framing climate HOPE at the center of our discussions.

If I can impart but one piece of knowledge from this retreat to all those reading this perspective, it would be to **treat the advocacy you do internally with the same passion and importance as your external advocacy**. That is to say that all of the volunteering, committees, meetings, policy reviews, river cleanups, outreach, and education work that you are doing to help impact change... how are you making time for what you need to keep your cup full? Our climate grief counselor for the retreat, Kaili van Waveren, said this to me on our first day, and it had a significant impact on how I examine my day-to-day activities. In reverence of the inextricable link between the mental health crisis and the climate crisis, it's important to also identify how that appears to me. I said before that it can feel like working in a vacuum. Internal advocacy forces us to take a step back and ask: Why do I feel that? Have I taken on too much? Who can I ask for help? And for crying out loud, ASK FOR HELP (if you struggle with this last one, know you are not alone!).



One way the retreat helped to refocus and reinvigorate my capacity for action was through a small service project on the campus of our retreat. We spent a hot July afternoon pulling invasive berry bushes from a portion of the property that will soon become a native food forest. As a water quality and river enthusiast, I have participated in many trash cleanups along the Big Sioux River. While it is satisfying to see the waste pile at the end of the day, it doesn't fully address the impairments in our waterways (primarily *E. coli* and sedimentation). In

pulling wineberries, however, we were directly fixing the issue of invasive plants for this wild and beautiful space. It was a major win, and a reminder that small actions have a meaningful and lasting impact. And it was a reminder that those hundreds of pounds of trash removed from the BSR each year are helping to improve the habitat for marine species as well!

We also made a point to learn nature-focused crafts that centered around reusing what otherwise might be considered "trash." I brought a paper bag full of discarded mail that we repurposed into seed paper. These papers will be gifted as cards, invitations, business cards, and more, where they will be given new life. At the end of their life cycle, they will provide beneficial habitats for pollinators and will grow strong, long roots to help stabilize the soil.

After the retreat, I saw a noticeable shift in my perspective. Small wins were easier to recognize, and they have since felt much more sustaining.

While there will always be more work ahead, this retreat helped me refocus on the positive work that is being done all around me. I hope to see this model come to Sioux Falls in the near future. There are so many people working tirelessly to move the



needle for a cleaner, greener community here that could use a collective moment of celebration, and I look forward to helping uplift you all in the future.
